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1 Complainant alleges:

2 PARTIES

3 1. Lisa M. Moore (Complainant) brings this Accusation solely in her official capacity as  
4 the Bureau Chief of the Cemetery and Funeral Bureau, Department of Consumer Affairs.<sup>1</sup>

5 2. On or about February 6, 1997, the Cemetery and Funeral Bureau (Bureau) issued  
6 Funeral Director License Number FDR 8 to Daniel Paul Galligan (Respondent). The Funeral  
7 Director License expired on February 28, 2010, and has not been renewed.

8 3. On or about September 17, 2004, the Bureau issued Cemetery Manager License  
9 Number CEM 210 to Respondent. The Cemetery Manager License was in full force and effect at  
10 all times relevant to the charges brought herein and will expire on September 30, 2013, unless  
11 renewed.

12 4. On or about May 19, 2011, the Bureau issued Cemetery Broker License Number  
13 CEB 1270 to Respondent. The Cemetery Broker License was in full force and effect at all times  
14 relevant to the charges brought herein and will expire on June 30, 2013, unless renewed.

15 JURISDICTION

16 5. This Accusation is brought before the Director of Consumer Affairs (Director) for the  
17 Cemetery and Funeral Bureau, under the authority of the following laws. All section references  
18 are to the Business and Professions Code (Code) unless otherwise indicated.

19 6. Section 118 of the Code states:

20 ". . . .

21 "(b) The suspension, expiration, or forfeiture by operation of law of a license issued by a  
22 board in the department, or its suspension, forfeiture, or cancellation by order of the board or by  
23 order of a court of law, or its surrender without the written consent of the board, shall not, during  
24 any period in which it may be renewed, restored, reissued, or reinstated, deprive the board of its

26 <sup>1</sup> Effective January 1, 1996, the Department of Consumer Affairs succeeded to, and was  
27 vested with, all the duties, powers, purpose, responsibilities and jurisdiction of the Cemetery  
28 Board and the Board of Funeral Directors and Embalmers, and consolidated the functions into the  
Cemetery and Funeral Programs. Effective January 1, 2001, the regulatory agency is designated  
as the Cemetery and Funeral Bureau.

1 authority to institute or continue a disciplinary proceeding against the licensee upon any ground  
2 provided by law or to enter an order suspending or revoking the license or otherwise taking  
3 disciplinary action against the licensee on any such ground.

4 "(c) As used in this section, 'board' includes an individual who is authorized by any  
5 provision of this code to issue, suspend, or revoke a license, and 'license' includes 'certificate,'  
6 'registration,' and 'permit.'"

7 7. Section 7725.2 of the Code states:

8 "Except as otherwise provided in this article, a license that has expired may be renewed at  
9 any time within five years after its expiration on filing of an application for renewal on a form  
10 prescribed by the bureau and payment of all accrued and unpaid renewal fees. If the license is not  
11 renewed within 30 days after its expiration the licensee, as a condition precedent to renewal, shall  
12 also pay the delinquency fee prescribed by this chapter. Renewal under this section shall be  
13 effective on the date on which the application is filed, on the date on which all renewal fees are  
14 paid, or on the date on which the delinquency fee, if any, is paid, whichever last occurs. If so  
15 renewed, the license shall continue in effect through the date provided in Section 7725 that next  
16 occurs after the effective date of the renewal, when it shall expire if it is not again renewed.

17 "If a license is not renewed within one year following its expiration, the bureau may require  
18 as a condition of renewal that the holder of the license pass an examination on the appropriate  
19 subjects provided by this chapter."

#### 20 STATUTORY PROVISIONS

21 8. Code section 9725 states:

22 "Upon grounds provided in this article [Article 6 (commencing with section 9725)], and the  
23 other articles of this act, the license of any cemetery licensee and the certificate of authority of  
24 any cemetery corporation may be revoked or suspended in accordance with the provisions of this  
25 article."

26 9. Code section 9727 states:

27 "The bureau may suspend or revoke the license of any cemetery licensee who, within the  
28 immediately preceding three years, has done any of the following:

1           "(a) Been convicted of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions and  
2 duties of such licensee. The record of conviction, or a certified copy thereof, shall be conclusive  
3 evidence of such conviction.

4           ". . . ."

5           10. Code section 9727.2 states:

6           "A plea or verdict of guilty or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere is deemed to  
7 be a conviction within the meaning of this article. The bureau may order the license suspended or  
8 revoked, or may decline to issue a license, when the time for appeal has elapsed, or the judgment  
9 of conviction has been affirmed on appeal or when an order granting probation is made  
10 suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under the provisions of  
11 Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code allowing such person to withdraw his or her plea of guilty and  
12 to enter a plea of not guilty, or setting aside the verdict of guilty, or dismissing the accusation,  
13 information or indictment."

14          11. Code section 7686 states:

15          "The bureau may suspend or revoke licenses, after proper notice and hearing to the  
16 licensee, if the licensee has been found guilty by the bureau of any of the acts or omissions  
17 constituting grounds for disciplinary action. The proceedings under this article shall be conducted  
18 in accordance with Chapter 5 of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, and the  
19 bureau shall have all the powers granted therein."

20          12. Code section 7691 states:

21          "Conviction of a crime substantially related to the qualifications, functions and duties of the  
22 license holder in question constitutes a ground for disciplinary action. The record of conviction,  
23 or a certified copy thereof, shall be conclusive evidence of such conviction."

24          13. Code section 7709 states:

25          "A plea or verdict of guilty or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere is deemed to  
26 be a conviction within the meaning of this article. The bureau may order the license suspended or  
27 revoked, or may decline to issue a license, when the time for appeal has elapsed, or the judgment  
28 of conviction has been affirmed on appeal or when an order granting probation is made

1 suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under the provisions of  
2 Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code allowing such person to withdraw his plea of guilty and to enter  
3 a plea of not guilty, or setting aside the verdict of guilty, or dismissing the accusation, information  
4 or indictment."

5 14. Section 482 of the Code states:

6 "Each board under the provisions of this code shall develop criteria to evaluate the  
7 rehabilitation of a person when:

8 ". . . .

9 "(b) Considering suspension or revocation of a license under Section 490.

10 "Each board shall take into account all competent evidence of rehabilitation furnished by  
11 the applicant or licensee."

12 15. Section 490 of the Code states:

13 "(a) In addition to any other action that a board is permitted to take against a licensee, a  
14 board may suspend or revoke a license on the ground that the licensee has been convicted of a  
15 crime, if the crime is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of the business  
16 or profession for which the license was issued.

17 "(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a board may exercise any authority to  
18 discipline a licensee for conviction of a crime that is independent of the authority granted under  
19 subdivision (a) only if the crime is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties  
20 of the business or profession for which the licensee's license was issued.

21 "(c) A conviction within the meaning of this section means a plea or verdict of guilty or a  
22 conviction following a plea of nolo contendere. Any action that a board is permitted to take  
23 following the establishment of a conviction may be taken when the time for appeal has elapsed, or  
24 the judgment of conviction has been affirmed on appeal, or when an order granting probation is  
25 made suspending the imposition of sentence, irrespective of a subsequent order under the  
26 provisions of Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code.

27 "(d) The Legislature hereby finds and declares that the application of this section has been  
28 made unclear by the holding in *Petropoulos v. Department of Real Estate* (2006) 142 Cal.App.4th

1 554, and that the holding in that case has placed a significant number of statutes and regulations  
2 in question, resulting in potential harm to the consumers of California from licensees who have  
3 been convicted of crimes. Therefore, the Legislature finds and declares that this section  
4 establishes an independent basis for a board to impose discipline upon a licensee, and that the  
5 amendments to this section made by Senate Bill 797 of the 2007 -08 Regular Session do not  
6 constitute a change to, but rather are declaratory of, existing law."

7 16. Section 493 of the Code states:

8 "Notwithstanding any other provision of law, in a proceeding conducted by a board within  
9 the department pursuant to law to deny an application for a license or to suspend or revoke a  
10 license or otherwise take disciplinary action against a person who holds a license, upon the  
11 ground that the applicant or the licensee has been convicted of a crime substantially related to the  
12 qualifications, functions, and duties of the licensee in question, the record of conviction of the  
13 crime shall be conclusive evidence of the fact that the conviction occurred, but only of that fact,  
14 and the board may inquire into the circumstances surrounding the commission of the crime in  
15 order to fix the degree of discipline or to determine if the conviction is substantially related to the  
16 qualifications, functions, and duties of the licensee in question.

17 "As used in this section, 'license' includes 'certificate,' 'permit,' 'authority,' and  
18 'registration.'"

19 REGULATORY PROVISIONS

20 17. California Code of Regulations, Title 16, Section 2330, states:

21 "For the purposes of denial, suspension or revocation of a license pursuant to Division 1.5  
22 (commencing with Section 475) of the Code, a crime or act shall be considered to be substantially  
23 related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a cemetery broker or salesperson if to a  
24 substantial degree it evidences present or potential unfitness of a cemetery broker or salesperson  
25 to perform the functions authorized by his or her license in a manner consistent with the public  
26 health, safety, or welfare. Such crimes or acts shall include but not be limited to those involving  
27 the following:

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“(a) Conviction of a crime involving fiscal dishonesty.

“(b) Any violation of the provisions of Chapter 19, Division 3 of the Code.”

18. California Code of Regulations, Title 16, Section 2331, subdivision (b), states:

“(b) When considering the suspension or revocation of a license on the ground that a cemetery broker or salesperson has been convicted of a crime, the bureau, in evaluating the rehabilitation of such person and his or her eligibility for a license, will consider the following criteria:

“(1) Nature and severity of the act(s) or offense(s).

“(2) Total criminal record.

“(3) The time that has elapsed since commission of the act(s) or offense(s).

“(4) Whether the licensee has complied with any terms of parole, probation, restitution or any other sanctions lawfully imposed against the licensee.

“(5) If applicable, evidence of expungement proceedings pursuant to Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code.

“(6) Evidence, if any, of rehabilitation submitted by the licensee.”

19. California Code of Regulations, Title 16, Section 1252, states:

“For the purposes of denial, suspension, or revocation of a license pursuant to Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 475) of the Business and Professions Code, a crime or act shall be considered to be substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of a licensed funeral establishment, licensed funeral director, or licensed embalmer if to a substantial degree it evidences present or potential unfitness of a licensed funeral establishment, licensed funeral director, or licensed embalmer to perform the functions authorized by his license in a manner consistent with the public health, safety, or welfare. Such crimes or acts shall include but not be limited to those involving the following:

“(a) Conviction of a crime involving fiscal dishonesty.

“(b) Any violation of the provisions of Chapter 12, Division 3 of the Business and Professions Code.”

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1 20. California Code of Regulations, Title 16, Section 1253.5, subdivision (a), states:

2 “(a) When considering the suspension or revocation of a license on the ground that a  
3 licensed funeral establishment, licensed funeral director, or licensed embalmer has been convicted  
4 of a crime, the bureau, in evaluating the rehabilitation of such person and his or her eligibility for  
5 a license, will consider the following criteria:

6 “(1) Nature and severity of the act(s) or offense(s).

7 “(2) Total criminal record.

8 “(3) The time that has elapsed since commission of the act(s) or offense(s).

9 “(4) Whether the licensee has complied with any terms of parole, probation, restitution or  
10 any other sanctions lawfully imposed against the licensee.

11 “(5) If applicable, evidence of expungement proceedings pursuant to Section 1203.4 of the  
12 Penal Code.

13 “(6) Evidence, if any, of rehabilitation submitted by the licensee.”

14 **COST RECOVERY**

15 21. Code section 125.3, subdivision (a), states, in pertinent part:

16 "Except as otherwise provided by law, in any order issued in resolution of a disciplinary  
17 proceeding before any board within the department . . . upon request of the entity bringing the  
18 proceedings may request the administrative law judge may direct a licentiate found to have  
19 committed a violation or violations of the licensing act to pay a sum not to exceed the reasonable  
20 costs of the investigation and enforcement of the case."

21 **CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINE**

22 **(June 7, 2011, Criminal Conviction for Grand Theft)**

23 22. Respondent is subject to disciplinary action under sections 9727, subdivision (a),  
24 7691 and 490 of the Code, in that he was convicted of a crime substantially related to the  
25 qualifications, functions or duties of a licensed funeral director, cemetery broker and cemetery  
26 manager. The circumstances are as follows:

27 A. On or about June 7, 2011, in a criminal proceeding entitled *People of the State of*  
28 *California v. Daniel Paul Galligan*, in the Superior Court of California, County of San Diego,

1 Case No. SCS245175, Respondent was convicted on his plea of guilty of violating Penal Code  
2 section 487, subdivision (a) (Grand Theft of Personal Property), a felony.

3 B. As a result of the conviction, on or about November 10, 2011, Respondent was  
4 sentenced to jail for one year, to formal probation for 3 years, and was ordered to pay restitution,  
5 as well as fines and fees.

6 C. The facts that led to the conviction are that on or about and between June 28, 2007,  
7 and July 1, 2009, Respondent stole money from Glen Abbey Memorial Park and Mortuary,  
8 located in San Diego, California, while acting as its Funeral Director and Cemetery Broker.  
9 Respondent stole approximately \$21,328 from Glen Abbey Memorial Park and Mortuary.

10 PRAYER

11 WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged,  
12 and that following the hearing, the Director of Consumer Affairs issue a decision:

- 13 1. Revoking or suspending Cemetery Broker License Number CEB 1270, issued to  
14 Daniel Paul Galligan;
- 15 2. Revoking or suspending Cemetery Manager License Number CEM 210, issued to  
16 Daniel Paul Galligan;
- 17 3. Revoking or suspending Funeral Director License Number FDR 8, issued to Daniel  
18 Paul Galligan;
- 19 4. Ordering Daniel Paul Galligan to pay the Cemetery and Funeral Bureau the  
20 reasonable costs of the investigation and enforcement of this case, pursuant to Business and  
21 Professions Code section 125.3;
- 22 5. Taking such other and further action as deemed necessary and proper.
